In this Update Number Two, we will tell you about some of the sights to be seen in the City of Norwich. Attendees will have free time to explore this 'fine' city on Saturday.




The Cathedral

The most famous building in Norwich is the Cathedral. It is the most complete Norman Cathedral in England. It is particularly famous for the glorious cloisters. It is located in beautiful peaceful grounds. Visits are FREE (donations welcome) and there are regular tours capturing the 900 years of history. A visit, even if it is just a quick glimpse, is a MUST.



The Market

Norwich has one of the largest outdoor markets in England with 200 stalls. It. situated in the market centre. Α has operated in Norwich since the eleventh century. The brightly painted roofs of the neat stalls make it very distinctive. Local food on includes sale jam, bread chutneys, and cakes. There is a wide range of new goods for sale including clothing,



leather goods, arts and craft gifts and jewellery. Second hand books, antiques and collectables can also be found at this extensive market.



The Castle Museum

The medieval castle has served Norwich as a fortification and a Royal Palace. It is now also a museum with an impressive collection of art, natural history and archaeological exhibits. There is a charge for entry into the Castle Museum

Riverside Walk

The River Wensom runs through Norwich and the tranquillity of a picturesque riverside walk is a stark contrast to the nearby busy streets of the city.





Shopping

Norwich centre is relatively small. It is full of surprises. One moment you can be in a new shopping arcade and soon after walking in a narrow, winding a cobbled lane. Old established shops can be discovered selling books, toys, crafts and, of course you can come across an old ale house now and again!

The Boys performed in Norwich in 1954 at the Hippodrome, which has long since gone. We will give you information on where the plaque is located – it is a bit challenging to locate but, of course, essential to see it.





This is just a taste of things to do and see in Norwich. One way to explore the city is on the sightseeing bus which takes an hour to go around the city. But please be aware that time is limited. We will arrange a bus transfer back from the city centre to the hotel at specified times.
